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


The Problem



The Premise of Preschool

Every child has access to a highly effective preschool program before they enter kindergarten

- Lack a uniform definition
- Essential elements: Effective curriculum; high-quality teacher-child interactions; and trained workforce
- Sufficient intensity to close gaps

The Promise of Preschool

Academic skills



Cognitive skills



Social skills



Under the right conditions, enrollment in preschool can help minimize achievement gap at kindergarten entry

Inequities in Access



Above 200% of the federal poverty line attended ECE

Inequities in Access to Quality Programs



Only 4% of children in rural communities have access to high quality teaching across the early years of education




Children living in high poverty communities are over <u>2X</u> as likely to experience <u>ineffective</u> instruction in ECE



Inequities in Attendance

Children for low-income and historically marginalized communities are at greatest risk of being absent from preschool



Chronic Absenteeism in Columbus



3-4X higher than state and national averages

Why are Children Absent from Preschool?

Family circumstances and necessity

- Adults and children in household
- Parent marital status
- Maternal employment
- Income-to-poverty measure
- Other sources of childcare available to family (e.g., relatives)
- Social support
 - How much support they perceive (loan money, take care of kids)
 - How supportive various sources of support are

Why are Children Absent from Preschool?

Family stress and routines

- Stress and instability may be associated with greater absenteeism
- Financial stress
 - Food insecurity and inadequacy of medical care
- Health stress
 - Maternal depressive symptoms and overall health
 - Child health
- Exposure to neighborhood violence
- Family and child routines
 - Average number of hours child slept and sleep schedules
 - Number of days family ate dinner together

Why are Children Absent from Preschool?

Center and classroom practices

- Parent outreach
 - Frequency of home visits and parent-teacher meetings
- Services provided to families
 - Medical, transportation, education/job training
- Classroom factors
 - Observed quality
 - Classroom behavior and classmate absenteeism
- Parents' feelings of welcomeness at the center
- Parents' perceptions of child's enjoyment of school

Why are Preschoolers Chronically Absent?

To what extent do family circumstances and necessity, family stress and routines, and center and classroom practices predict children's absenteeism and likelihood of chronic absenteeism?

Family and Child Experiences Study 2009 (n = 3,349)

- Nationally representative sample of first time Head Start children from 486 classrooms in the U.S.
- First national data with preschool absences

Why are Preschoolers Chronically Absent?

Necessity factors do not consistently matter

Household structure, income, other care availability, and social support were **not** associated with absenteeism



Whether parents received social support from other parents in a child's school and mothers' employment

Why are Preschoolers Chronically Absent?

Stress and Routines Matter a Great Deal

Food insecurity, inadequate medical care, child poor health, fewer hours of sleep, irregular sleep schedules, and neighborhood violence were associated with <u>elevated</u> levels of absenteeism

Classroom Context and Experiences Matter

More services provided to families, higher classroom quality, fewer peer absenteeism, and children's enjoyment were associated with <u>lower</u> levels of absenteeism

Preschool Attendance is the Best Predictor of Absenteeism in Elementary School


The Consequences of Preschool Absenteeism

White-Black Gap as a Function of Absenteeism



- White-Black gap at low levels of absenteeism between kindergarten and fifth grade
- White-Black gap at high levels of absenteeism between kindergarten and fifth grade

The Long-term Consequences of Absenteeism



No difference in risky and deviant behavior



Less likely to be employed



More likely to experience economic hardship



Less likely to have voted in the 2012 election



Lower HS GPA & fewer years of postsecondary education
