# The Missing Link: Student Voice in Family Engagement

A middle school hosts parent-teacher conferences for all seventh graders' families on a Thursday afternoon. After parents arrive at the school building, they must find the assigned rooms by themselves. Teachers greet the parents in English and give them report cards printed in English. During a one-on-one meeting, the teacher focuses on what the student has not been doing well in school. Sometimes, the teacher says to the parent something like, "I am not sure why, but Emma doesn't seem to care about her homework. Maybe if you monitored her more closely at home, she would get her homework done." By the end of the meeting, the teacher and the parents discuss what they believe are the appropriate goals and strategies for the student.
